LIBR 2516 – Readers' Advisory Services – Spring 2026

Course Format: Online

Course Description, Prerequisites, and Corequisites:

This course acquaints students with reading and media interests of adults in preparation for readers' advisory (RA) work in these areas. Issues related to readers' advisory service in public and other library settings are covered, as well as the basic tenets of readers' advisory. Students learn how to interview readers to determine their reading interests, and explore RA tools that are available for making reading and viewing recommendations.

Corequisites: None

Upon completing the course, students will be able to:

1. practice acceptance of and support for the varied reading interests of adults
2. interview a reader to determine their reading/viewing/listening interests
3. make recommendations for pleasure reading/viewing/listening in a number of genres/subject areas
4. create a genre/theme guide
5. design a readers' advisory program
6. create a book trailer or book talk on a specific title
7. concisely summarize a book's appeal factors in writing and orally
8. demonstrate understanding of the philosophy behind readers' advisory

Methodology

- Unmarked activities, class discussions, participation and attendance: students will be expected to interact with each other and the instructor in course discussions and complete activities weekly.
- Assignments: Several graded assignments will be assigned throughout the term.

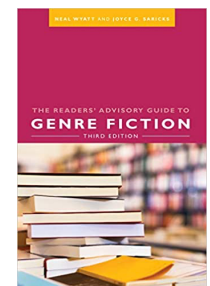
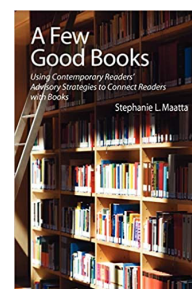
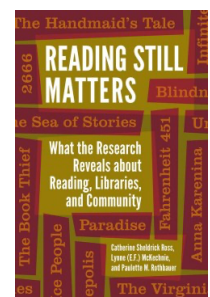
Required:

- Herald, D. T. & Stavole-Carter, S. (2019). *Genreflecting: A guide to popular reading interests* (8th edition). Santa Barbara, CA: Libraries Unlimited.
 - NB: This text is available through the Langara library as a print book. I have asked to have it put on reserve, so that people can use it in the library and it will always be available. Call number: PS 374 P63 R67 2019. There appear to be two copies. (<https://twist.langara.ca/record=b1886921~S1>)
 - I will be making certain chapters available on Brightspace for those who cannot purchase it or go to Langara to use it.
 - If you want to use the 7th edition, that will also work, though some readings will be slightly different. It tends to be slightly cheaper to purchase used if that's what you'd like to do. Note that the book lists will of course be older in the older edition.
 - Finally, regardless of where you're located, most public libraries have this title as it's a standard source for use by library staff.
- Selected chapters from Saricks, J. G. (2005). *Readers' advisory service in the public library* (3rd ed). Chicago: American Library Association.
 - NB: This book is available as an ebook through the Langara library <https://twist.langara.ca/record=b1876371~S1>. It's an excellent resource if you feel inclined to purchase it, but there is no need to do so for this course.
